

DESCRIPTION OF HIKING TRAILS

1. LODGE TRAIL—MODERATE—.9 mile. Joins with Trail 2 for a short distance to return near Lodge. Walk through woods with oak, hickory, sassafras, beech and maple.
 2. CCC TRAIL—MODERATE—2 miles. CCC built trail with impressive stone bridges, stairways, and retaining walls. Starts and ends behind the lodge. Passes near Lower Shelter and North Lookout Tower.
 3. SADDLE BARN LOOP TRAIL—MODERATE—1.25 miles. Observe a variety of topography. Passes saddle barn and amphitheatre and returns to lodge. Varieties of ferns can be seen in the ravines and on the slopes.
 4. RALLY CAMPGROUND TRAIL—MODERATE—1.25 miles. Starts near the front of the rally campground and leads through upland terrain to a deep ravine at the headwaters of Ogle Lake. Joins Trail 7 for short distance. Meets with Trail 5 at Ogle Hollow Nature Preserve.
 5. OGLE HOLLOW NATURE PRESERVE TRAIL—RUGGED—.75 mile. This self-guiding trail starts near the parking lot for Rally Campground and follows a wooded slope with yellowwood trees, loops through the nature preserve and intersects with Trail 4 from Ogle Lake.
 6. STRAHL LAKE TRAIL—EASY/RUGGED—.75 mile. Easy walk around Strahl Lake. A challenging .5 mile spur to the Nature Center.
 7. OGLE LAKE TRAIL—MODERATE—1.5 miles. A hilly, wooded trail invites you to explore the shores of Ogle Lake.
 8. HHC TRAIL—MODERATE—3.5 miles. Extends eastward from West Lookout, continues to near Hesitation Point, and then southwest to parking area at Ogle Lake & Trail 7. Trail improved by volunteers from the Hoosier Hikers Council 2002-2007.
 9. TAYLOR RIDGE TRAIL—RUGGED—3.0 /2.75 miles. Starts near Site 324 in campground. No parking at trailhead. Travels ridgetop beyond campground, dropping into adjacent valley to follow stream for some distance before looping back to ridgetop. A 2.75 mile extension connects to Trail 7 near Ogle Lake.
 10. FIRE TOWER TRAIL—RUGGED—2.2 miles. Follows ridge behind Firetower before looping northward crossing deep ravines and hilltops. Passes C.C.C. shelter.
- FRIENDS TRAIL—EASY.** Short, easy, paved trail, with benches and vista on flat terrain; constructed by the Friends of Brown County State Park.
- DISCOVERY TRAIL—MODERATE—.5 mile.** Self-guiding nature trail. Brochure available at the trailhead at the south end of the Nature Center parking lot.

ACTIVITIES AND FACILITIES

CAMPING — Campground equipped with flush toilets, hot water and showers. Occupancy limited to 14 consecutive nights. A separate horsemen's campground is available. Rally campground available. Camping reservations available through the Central Reservation System.

CAMP STORE — Camping and picnic supplies, firewood, souvenirs. Open April thru October.

FAMILY CABINS — Two bedrooms, living rooms; complete kitchen; bathroom; will sleep eight; linens; dishware and cooking utensils provided; easy walking distance to the Lodge. Make Brown County State Park family cabin reservations through the inns reservation system.

FISHING — Bass, bluegill, etc. State license required and available at park office. Rowboats permitted on Ogle Lake only. Ogle Lake—17 acres; Strahl Lake—7 acres.

HIKING — More than 18 miles of easy-to-rugged trails.

HORSE TRAILS — Facilities for those who wish to bring their own horses.

INN — Lodge and cabin guest rooms, restaurant, banquet and meeting facilities. Open year-round. Reservations available through the inns reservation system.

INTERPRETIVE NATURALIST SERVICE — Inquire at nature center, park office, or lodge. Program schedules are available on the website at www.interpretiveservices.IN.gov or call (812) 988-5240.

MOUNTAIN BIKE TRAILS — Moderate to Difficult. 10 miles. For bikers and hikers. Winds around hills, ravines and across streams. Starts from parking lot south of the pool; also access points near North Lookout Tower and Hesitation Point. 250 ft. of change in elevation. Built and maintained by volunteers.

PICNIC AREAS — Tables, grills, toilet facilities, playground equipment and playfields. Wood available from Camp Store during summer months.

SHELTERS — Reservations available through the Central Reservation System.

SADDLE BARN — Bridle trails, pony rides, hayrides. Inquire at saddle barn or (812) 988-8166 (seasonal).

SWIMMING — Olympic size pool, open Saturday before Memorial Day and no later than Labor Day. Pool may close toward end of summer when there are no lifeguards available. Swimming prohibited in Ogle and Strahl Lakes.

THIS IS YOUR PARK

All visitors are expected to observe the following rules which are designed to fulfill the purpose for which state parks were established, namely, to preserve a primitive landscape in its natural condition for the use and enjoyment of the people.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

- Do not injure or damage any structure, rock, tree, flower, bird or wild animal within the Park. Do NOT gather limbs, brush or trees (either dead or alive) for firewood! It MUST be allowed to remain to rebuild the natural humus.
- Any firearm (except validly licensed handguns) BB gun, air gun, CO2 gun, bow and arrow, or spear gun in possession in a state park must be unloaded or un-nocked and stored in a case or locked within a vehicle except when participating in an activity authorized by written permit.
- Dogs and cats must be kept on a leash no longer than six feet and attended at all times.
- There shall be no vending or advertising without permission of the Department of Natural Resources.
- Camping is permitted only in the campground. Youth groups must be under adult supervision.
- Fires shall be built only in places provided.
- Please comply with the Carry In/Carry Out trash policy in all day use areas. Overnight guests must put waste in receptacles provided for that purpose.
- Motorists will observe speed limits as posted, and park in designated areas. 30 m.p.h. maximum.
- Swimming is limited to the pool only.
- Drinking water should be taken only from pumps, hydrants or fountains provided for that purpose. This water is tested regularly for purity.
- Report lost or found articles to the park office.
- Pull off roads while observing wildlife. Feeding of wildlife is prohibited.
- Use of metal detectors is prohibited.

INDIANA



Brown County State Park is the largest Indiana State Park. This nationally known 15,696 acre facility first opened to the public in 1929.

In the first few years as the park grew in popularity, several facilities were developed. Abe Martin Lodge, several cabins and a saddle barn were built, as was a swimming pool. The roads, entrances, and many trails were added and improved during this time.

On June 1, 1934, the Veteran's Civilian Conservation Corps Company 1557 began its work. The planting of black locust, black walnut, various pines and spruces gave nature a helping hand in healing extreme erosion. The CCC workers also built many of the existing buildings, shelters, ovens, roads, trails and the west lookout tower. They cleared most of the vistas along the park's roadway and built Ogle Lake in 1934-35. Strahl Lake was built earlier, around 1929.

For those who would rather see the park on foot or horseback, many miles of well-marked trails are available. About 70 miles of bridle trails and over 18 miles of hiking trails lead through the steep, forested hills. The Ogle Hollow Nature Preserve, within the park, contains an attractive self-guiding nature trail, which describes natural aspects of the park.

Picnickers have their choice of several picnic areas — some of which have shelters equipped with fireplaces. Several have comfort stations located nearby.

The park has a nature center in which a snake exhibit, bird-watching room and other displays are housed. Naturalist services are available year-round, however, reduced hours are in effect for the winter season.

The wildlife that inhabits Brown County State Park includes a variety of species adapted to life in the forest and forest edges. Some mammals such as the white-tailed deer, raccoon, gray squirrel, and various birds including robin, white-breasted nuthatch, blue-jay, cardinal, junco, crow and wild turkey are seen by visitors.

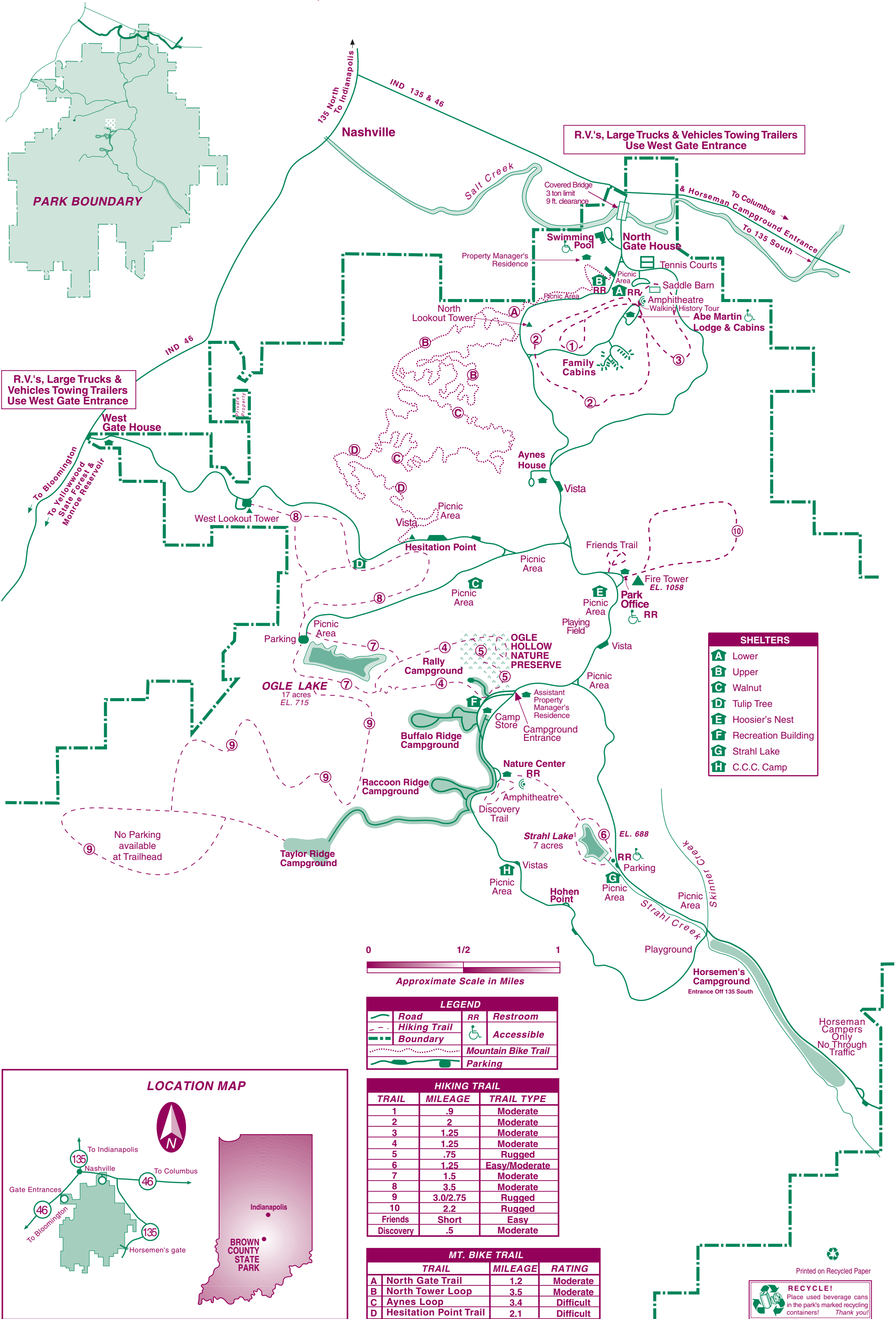
Camping sites are available year-round. The campgrounds have electrical hook-ups and modern comfort stations and showers. Brown County also has a horsemen's campground located in the extreme southern part of the park. For those visitors who prefer all of the comforts of home, Abe Martin Lodge contains 84 lodge rooms (each with two beds and bathroom), as well as two large meeting rooms, and a dining room. There are also 24 sleeping cabins for rent with a total of 56 bedrooms. Twenty family cabins, completely furnished, are available year-round. The park offers a swimming pool, shelterhouses, playground equipment, fishing on two lakes, bridle trails and a country store for picnic supplies and souvenirs.

The varied facilities of Brown County State Park make possible enjoyable outdoor experiences for people with a wide range of tastes and preferences.

Please let wild animals remain wild. Feeding deer is prohibited. Feeding of wild animals can result in harm to both animals and people. Animals that depend on handouts become a nuisance to park visitors and a danger to themselves. Please lock up all food and coolers inside cars or campers. Roll car windows up tightly.
